

PSHE Curriculum Statement

Jigsaw is more than a PSHE Scheme of Work. It provides a structured programme of personal development to nurture the 'whole child' and increase learning capacity, underpinned by mindfulness philosophy and practice. Every Jigsaw lesson from Early Years to upper primary offers opportunities for children's spiritual, moral, social and cultural (SMSC) development, and this is clearly mapped and balanced across each year group. Likewise, Jigsaw is designed to provide structured opportunities in every lesson to practise and enhance the five skills associated with the emotional literacy (self-awareness, social skills, empathy, motivation and managing feelings). At The Federation of Eileen Wade and Milton Ernest C of E Primary School believe that these opportunities are vital for children's development, their understanding of themselves and others and in increasing their capacity to learn

There are six Puzzles in Jigsaw that are designed to progress in sequence from the start of each academic year:

Autumn 1: Being Me in My World

Autumn 2: Celebrating Difference (including anti-bullying)

Spring 1: Dreams and Goals

Spring 2: Healthy Me

Summer 1: Relationships

Summer 2: Changing Me (including Sex Education)

Each Puzzle has six Pieces (lessons) which work towards an 'end product', for example, The School Learning Charter or The Garden of Dreams and Goals. Each Piece has two Learning Intentions: one is based on specific PSHE learning and one is based on emotional literacy and social skills development.

The whole school works on the same Puzzle at the same time, meaning that each Puzzle can be launched with a whole-school assembly and learning can be celebrated by the whole school in a meaningful way.

Pol-Ed

We also use resources from Pol-Ed that further supports our curriculum to develop a deep awareness of risks, citizenship and the law.

Internet Safety

Internet Safety will be incorporated into PSHE following the Purple Mash Scheme 2BeSafe which is an online safety scheme of work, to meet the guidance set out within the Department for Education's - Education for a Connected World. The Education for a Connected World framework outlines eight key areas which seek to equip children and young people for digital life and the digital world. 2Simple's 2BeSafe offers a comprehensive coverage of these requirements for primary schools starting from Reception up to Year 6. For each objective, they have produced a 15-to-20-minute session containing activities to promote discussion, greater thinking and deeper reflection in order to raise the profile of the importance of staying safe online
